Fears that Toton will lose HS2 Hub



There are rumours that the East Midlands HS2 Hub may not be sited at Toton. If this is the case, then this is bad news for Broxtowe. If the route of the line is accordingly changed so it avoids parts of Trowell, Nuthall and in particular Strelley Village, that will be welcomed, but, losing the East Midlands Hub would be a real blow. All three political parties on the Borough, City and County Councils have quite rightly backed the original plans to site the Hub at Toton Sidings; it promises huge economic, as well as transport benefits, to Broxtowe and indeed Greater Nottingham.

As you know I have campaigned with groups like SB2020 to make sure Broxtowe Borough Council did all it could to promote Toton as the site for the Hub. We have therefore campaigned against the

Borough's plans to allow a minimum of 500 houses to be built on the Green Belt land next to the Sidings and rejected their plans for second rate economic development at the site as it lacks vision and world class quality.

Both Richard Jackson, the leader of the Conservatives on the Borough Council, and I have said that it has never been certain that the Hub would be sited at Toton and have warned that Broxtowe's plans could scupper the Hub coming to Broxtowe. Our views have been dismissed and derided.

I am told that a report will be published in the next few weeks. I very much hope we have not lost the East Midlands Hub at Toton but if we have, I hope it is not as a result of the Borough Council's plans.

I will of course keep you updated.

Trowell Opencast - Highways meeting

Notts County Council have still to finalise legal agreements with UK Coal after agreeing to allow open cast coal mining between Trowell and Cossall at Shortwood Farm.

This week, the County Council arranged a meeting between myself, County Councillors Ken Rigby and Philip Owen, officers from the County, UK Coal and the Highways Authority (HA). If opencast mining must go ahead, we all want the HA to allow the HGV lorries carting the coal off the site, access to and from the M1 through the Trowell motorway services area. My thanks to Cllr John Wilkinson for arranging the meeting - he has been very helpful.



Unfortunately, the County Council approved the plans which included a route all the way up to Nuthall roundabout on to the M1 and then back down to Radcliffe Power Station. It is a great shame the alternative direct access to the M1 was not fully explored before permission was granted by the County.

UK Coal and Notts will do some work to advance the idea but the HA made it clear they are highly unlikely to change their minds. Meanwhile, I will raise this directly with the Secretary of State for Transport.

Our hospitals - getting better and better



The QMC and City have published some encouraging news about improvements in both hospitals.

£3.7 million has been invested at the QMC on 69 extra beds to cope with the increase demand on emergency services. There will be 12 more cubicles in the Emergency Department and I am assured there is much better working with social care so patients are ready to leave hospital and return home with good support.

The 2014 National Cancer Patient Survey shows patients are feeling they get better care now at the QMC and City, with the Hospital Trust in the top 10 most improved trusts in the country for these patient satisfaction results.

And they are reducing car parking charges!

Finally seven excellent doctors, nurses and other workers from the City and QMC are in the finals of the NHS Recognition Awards.

Our hospitals are able to improve because we have not just protected NHS spending, but we have

increased it year on year. I am very pleased the Prime Minister made it clear that a future Conservative Government will not cut NHS spending. This is in sharp contrast to Labour's plans which would have seen a cut in NHS spending in the last four years; Ed Milliband's pledge to increase spending by £2.5 billion a year should he become PM, is actually less than the extra money put into the NHS by the current Government, last year. Even the Guardian, not exactly known as a Conservative newspaper, recognises the real increases the Government has made in NHS spending and that our plans, if elected next May, would mean more money for the NHS than Labour has promised.

Typhoon swoops over Broxtowe

It rattled the windows of my constituency office, put Cllr. Steve Carr off his curry in Chilwell's Havelli, made Emma's dog bark in Beeston and brought lots of you into your gardens for a look in Toton and Attenborough. The roar of a low flying fighter jet on Tuesday evening even promoted a story in the Evening Post. So, as a Defence Minister apparently well placed to find out more, I made enquiries of my team in the MOD who contacted the RAF; they reported as follows

"The aircraft concerned was a Typhoon from RAF Coningsby. XI Sqn aircraft were conducting a practice diversion to East Midlands Airport as part of a Quick Reaction Alert (QRA) training sortie. The pilot made an approach, under radar control, to the airport and followed East Midlands' Air Traffic Control instructions (speed, bearing and altitude) to fly a departure to de-conflict with other traffic as he is mandated to do in controlled airspace. The pilot noted his departure clearance from Air Traffic Control levelled him at c. 2000 feet and, cognisant of the built up area around the airport, requested a further climb for noise abatement reasons which allowed him to climb to c. 8000 feet. The pilot kept his speed low at the required levels for the class of airspace he was in." That's cleared that up then.....

Tram works update - the end is nigh!

The roads through Beeston will be open early November. Certainly Chilwell/High Road is well on its way to being opened in the next few weeks.

I had a good meeting with TWA earlier in the week.

Landscaping works, garden reinstatements and installation of the last overhead line poles should be well underway in the next few weeks. I know there are problems so please contact me.

I specifically asked TWA to make sure all roads are properly lit following many complaints not least from my constituency staff working late!

TWA assure me they will make sure everyone on the Chilwell part of the route will get the fence they want and will press the Tram Operators to meet residents as a matter of urgency to sort out ownership and maintenance issues.

I understand some 52 businesses in Beeston/Chilwell/Toton and Clifton are claiming financial assistance and I am very pleased to have persuaded the County and City Councils to include all businesses affected by the tram works. Anyone seeking compensation should email net.enquiries@nottsc.gov.uk. and/or contact me as I have had helped a number of businesses.

Finally, the tram tracks have proved very dangerous for some cyclists who have suffered serious injuries. To their credit TWA fought off opposition from the County Council and have put up warning signs. Meanwhile I am grateful to constituents who have urged me to ask NET to install rubber inserts into tracks where there are no cycle lanes. It is somewhat ironic if not pretty shocking, that in Beeston some of the route is too narrow for cyclists to travel safely, so a new piece of public transport runs the risk of reducing pedal power!

There really is no debate - we simply cannot allow other communities to suffer as people have done in Broxtowe, from this type of badly planned and managed infrastructure project.
